Here you will be able to find out the details about what your child will be learning week by week. We have included the books and songs we will focus on. If you have any questions, please ask.


Week 1 Lifecycle of a Human

Numbers & Patterns

- Week 1 Understanding of odd and even numbers and that not all numbers can be shared equally.
- Week 2 Consolidation of subitising, counting, composition, sorting and matching, comparing and ordering, using numbers beyond 10 and investigating 100.
- Week 3 Develop knowledge of common 2D shapes, noticing details such as edges and corners. Play with, explore, and rotate shapes to create patterns, other shapes and shapes made of shapes.
- Week 4 Use spatial reasoning and the language associated with this to follow and make maps and give and follow directions.
- Week 5 Explore and investigate relationships/patterns between numbers and shapes and develop spacial reasoning.
- Week 6 Develop understanding of numbers to 10 and beyond.
- Week 7 Develop understanding of numbers to 10 and beyond in relation to counting patterns.

- Studying the famous painting by Vincent van Gogh
- Developing observation, sketching and shading skills/techniques.

PSHE through our whole school programme - Jigsaw

Our theme this half term across the school is Changing Me.

- Meditation, looking after own wellbeing and calming strategies.
- Understanding what being responsible means.
- Know how to look after things.
- To show respect for rules.
- Exploring what responsibility means.
- Identifying and labelling non intimate body parts.



- Recall names of tuned and un-tuned percussion.
- Use musical vocabulary, e.g. pulse, rhythm, tempo.
- Join in and sing an accumulative song.
- Begin to be able to distinguish between pulse/rhythm.
- Sing with increasing confidence.
- Play and sing at the right time.




- Negotiate space successfully when playing racing and chasing games with other children, adjusting speed, or changing direction to avoid obstacles.
- Show increasing control over an object in pushing, patting, throwing, catching, or kicking it.
- Experiment with different ways of moving.
- Move confidently in a range of ways, safely negotiating space.






Lateness

We are finding that an increasing number of children are arriving late to school in the morning and for some children this seems to be often. Moving to Year One



Drop in for Vaccinations

Our health partners have organised drop-in clinics for young children who aren't up to date with their vaccinations. Uptake levels for all childhood vaccinations — such as whooping cough, measles, and polio - have been falling over the past decade. Vaccinating children helps to create wider immunity which can protect people with serious health conditions.
